



PROBLEMS: Integrating the space between the back and side yard terraces; accommodating grade changes; developing the right plant palette


SOLUTIONS: Right plant materials and stonework create desired aesthetic


KEY PLANTINGS: Hydrangea arborescens 'Annabelle' (Annabelle Smooth Hydrangea); Hydrangea macrophylla 'Bailmer' (Endless Summer Hydrangea); Nepeta spp. (Catmint); Veronica 'Sunny Border Blue' (Sunny Border Blue Speedwell); Salvia 'May Night' (May Night Meadow Sage)

o transform a Connecticut site, landscape architect Eva Chiamulera worked with contractor Shoreline Pools to install a fieldstone seat wall and bluestone terrace to accommodate the site's grade changes. Eva's planting program replicates the feeling of the casual blue and white gardens of Nantucket. In addition to blue and white hydrangeas for color, she also inserted grasses for a rustling sound and boxwood hedges for year-round greenery and structure. A new spa adds another water delight.





blooming shrubs for all seasons

For long-lasting blooms, combine these lilacs, roses and hydrangeas.

- COMPACT Bloomerang® Purple Lilac (zones 3-7) produces fragrant blooms in spring and reblooms during the summer and early fall.
- COLOR-CHANGING Little Lime™ Hardy Hydrangea (zones 3-9) is a dwarf hydrangea with flowers that start lime green, turning shimmering white as the season progresses. Hints of pink emerge with frost and the flowers later dry in place to a light tan for winter.
- PETITE Red Drift® Rose (zones 4-10) provides a great front of the border complement to the pair; at only 18" high this cherry red groundcover rose blooms repeatedly from spring until fall.
